The Fourth Sunday of Easter April 20 and 21, 2024

Welcome in the name of Our Lord Jesus Christ! If you come as a visitor today, we hope you will leave as a friend. We count it a privilege and a blessing to have you with us in worship. If you are not presently a member of any congregation, please feel welcome to gather with us around Jesus in this community of his disciples at Holy Trinity. Come and worship with us again!

We welcome and encourage children of all ages to be in worship. Sitting with children in a front pew and giving them the seat on the center aisle helps them to see and participate in our worship. For children who are present in worship, there are a variety of games, toys, puzzles, coloring supplies and snacks in the Kids' Prayground cabinet in the narthex near the coat rack. If children need a break, there is a TV set up downstairs in the nursery so parents can watch the worship live-stream. If you are visiting, an usher can help direct you to the nursery.

Invitation to Communion: Holy Communion is the body and blood of Jesus Christ by which our Lord is truly present to forgive sin and bring life and salvation. All baptized Christians who believe this promise are welcome to commune. Parents with children are encouraged to come to the altar together. Children who do not yet receive communion will receive the blessing of the Church from the Pastor.

Procedure for Communing: Approach the altar rail through the door to the front left, take a small glass from the tray and move to the furthest place open, kneeling if you are able, or standing. Receive the host either in your open palm or in your mouth; receive the wine poured into the small glass, saying "Amen" after receiving each. If you are unable to consume either the bread or wine, be assured that Christ is fully present for us in either element; reverence the body or blood of Christ by saying "Amen" when the host or the cup is presented. Leave by the right, placing your empty glass in the tray provided, and return to your pew.

Gluten-free wafers are available; let the pastor know when you come forward to receive.

Significance of the Day: The image of the good shepherd shows us how the risen Christ brings us to life. It is the relationship between the shepherd and the sheep, one of mutual knowledge and love, that gives the shepherd authority. The shepherd's willingness to lay down his life for the sheep shows his love. First John illustrates what it means to lay down our lives for one another by the example of sharing our wealth with any sibling in need.

Water may be poured into the font as the presiding minister continues.


Glory to you for oceans and lakes, for rivers and streams.


Wash away our sin and all that separates us from you. Empower our witness to your resurrection. Strengthen our resolve in seeking justice for all.





from him whatever we ask, because we obey his commandments and do what pleases him.



Music Notes

Based on today's lectionary, the Fourth Sunday of Easter is traditionally called 'Good Shepherd Sunday'. Therefore the spoken words, hymns, anthem, and music for this Sunday reflect this theme of Christ as the good shepherd.

Our communion hymn, *The Lord's my shepherd*, is a metrical paraphrase of today's appointed psalm, Psalm 23. It is set to the beautiful hymn tune by James Leith Bain, 1860-1925, who was a Scottish hymn writer, minister, and author. James L. Bain was known to his peers as "Brother James". The organ prelude by Searle Wright is based on this hymn melody *Brother James' Air* by Bain.

The choir anthem is by Howard Goodall. It is his pastoral setting of selected words from Psalm 23 and was used as the theme music for the award-winning BBC TV series, *The Vicar of Dibley*. The organ postlude is by Malcolm Archer. Born in 1953, Archer is an English organist, composer, and conductor. He was director of music at Bristol, Wells, and St. Paul's cathedrals. His *Duchy Fanfare and March* is from his *Lancaster Suite for Organ* written in 2019 as a fundraiser for the large Ashton Town Hall organ.
